The event turned out to be a very relaxing weekend where we could chat with old and new friends and shop, and maybe take some stitches in between sharing stories.

The Region was successful in their bid for a venue with the International Teacher Tour. We will host Alison Cole for 2 days of classes. Our dates are Nov. 10 and 11. The class(es) are to be selected. Contact your region rep and voice your preference. We can choose between two 1 day classes or one 2-day class. Your region rep must contact Cheri Hammer, Education Chair, by June 10th for their vote to count. We are looking at a venue in either Orlando or St. Pete to hold the class. Students will be responsible for their kit fee, their personal travel expense and meals. The region will sponsor the teacher picking up the expense for her lodging, travel and teaching fee. Stay tuned for more info. Cheri Hammer will have information on how to enroll later.





Kathy Singleton, Region Director



Kathy began stitching at the age of 5. She would spend the weekends at her grandmother's house and she learned embroidery and crochet from her. Mind you, this was free hand embroidery, no counting, no hoops, etc. Her first real project was a chicken scratch apron – yellow – a color Kathy now doesn't really care for. Her grandmother embroidered quilt squares and Kathy would embroider the stamped pillowcases to match. Naturally, surface embroidery remains her favorite stitching.

She continued stitching through the 70's where she was in demand to embroider on jeans, jackets, etc etc. Remember all of that? In the

80s' she started bigger projects, including crewel, pulled thread, and bead embroidery. And that's when the Christmas stocking thing started. She has now stitched a stocking for everyone in her family – that includes her immediate family, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, etc. etc. Now when anyone gets married or has a baby, the question becomes what will the stocking look like. Her niece's fiancée bothered her for a year making sure that he was going to be presented one, thus leading Kathy to believe that is why he married her niece.

Kathy has held lots of positions in EGA having joined Windy Stitchers in Chicago when she discovered a flyer for EGA at a local shop. She's held every chapter position except for president. She is proud of her two terms as National Treasurer and the work that was accomplished there. That experience really broadened her knowledge of EGA's workings and the reasons why some things are done the way that they are. At the region level, she has chaired a region seminar and retreat and currently serves as the region treasurer.

Melody Bryan, Assistant Region Director



Melody's history with EGA goes back a long way. She joined EGA when she was still in high school. She was a charter member of the now defunct LeMoyne Chapter in Jacksonville. She found out about a guild forming from the LNS owner who became a lifelong friend and still is today. She remained active in LeMoyne for a few years but her developing passion was showing purebred dogs and that took over and dominated her life for the next 25 years.

Like many of you – Melody learned to embroider and crochet from her grandmother. She learned to do simple needlepoint at about age 8 or 10. Even though she was very involved in traveling and exhibiting Afghan Hounds, needlework was always a part of her life.

In the mid 2000's, Melody joined the Dixie Chapter in Columbus, GA in which she still retains a plural membership. She decided after moving to Orange Park in 2008 that she should visit the duClay Chapter. She originally joined as a plural member, but has been primary member for a few years now. She has held a couple of offices in duClay and is currently VP/Programs & Education.

These days Melody spends a lot of time doing traditional wool rug hooking. She's been a "hooker" for about 15+ years now. She is a member of the NF Rug Hooking Guild as well as their parent national guild. She is an avid knitter, has a deep love of samplers and the history that goes along with them, and still enjoys doing various types of canvaswork.

Cheri Hammer, Secretary



Cheri has been fascinated with stitching from a very young age. Completely self-taught and self-guided, she gobbled up all of those crafty kits you get as a child. Then she ventured into counted cross-stitch, spending years making little x's on fabric. But then one day she saw a poster for a needle art exhibit, and that totally changed her world! The Sand Dunes Chapter in Northwest Florida held a bi-annual show and that was Cheri's introduction into the wonderful world of EGA.

Cheri joined Sand Dunes in the early 90s, and quickly volunteered to be the night liaison for the chapter. Education is her passion, and she wanted the night meeting attendees to have the same opportunities as the day meeting attendees. Over the years, several times she has held the position of education chairman and/or vice president (in charge of programs).

Cheri has also been her chapter's region representative, and has been exposed to Sun Region operations. She was the Merchandise Night chairman for both the 2000 and 2011 national seminars. She is currently the education chairman for both her chapter and the region.

Lynn Abbey, Treasurer



Lynn was fortunate to be surrounded by threadbenders as a child. Her mother and both her grandmothers knit, sewed, knotted, and crocheted. They shared their skills with her regularly, but sometimes competitively so it was no great surprise that she gravitated toward a threadbending art that did not fascinate her mentors: embroidery.

She learned embroidery in a thoroughly haphazard, self-taught manner until discovering the EGA by accident in 1978 (A neighbor's copy of Needle Arts appeared in her mailbox by mistake!). After that, embroidery became Lynn's passion. She joined the Ann Arbor (MI) chapter and volunteered to be its education officer at her first meeting

In Ann Arbor, Lynn went on to serve as newsletter editor, region representative, and president. From Ann Arbor she moved to Oklahoma and joined the Central Oklahoma chapter where she

took over their newsletter. In 1997 she moved to Central Florida and joined the Chain Stitchers chapter where she has served as region representative, president, and other positions; she is currently the chapter's newsletter editor and outreach co-chair. She has served as the Sun Region Secretary for the past 5 years.

OUTREACH - JoyceAnne Stevens, chair

Sun Region chapters continue to reach out to the people and communities around them. If your chapter has not yet done any Outreach this year, you may find some really great ideas in the following. Exhibits and stitching in public are good way to demonstrate what we actually do, i.e., stitch. Making stitched items, making monetary donations, and collecting and donating various things are other ways to reach out. Several of the chapters have year long projects they are working on. Sand Dunes is embroidering Christmas stockings. Needle Arts just arrived today and there is a photo of Sand Dunes members on p 8 of the center insert with the fleece blankets they made and donated last year. Sea Grape has knitted/crocheted 109 Baby Caps and 108 Chemo Caps for Lee Memorial Hospital which represents 711 volunteer hours since January. Sand Dollar is making Christmas Ornaments for Atlantic School. Biscayne also donated caps for children, close to 60 to 2 different hospitals. Biscayne has stitched and sent off 60 Kissing Pillows for U.S. Military members and stitched 50 bookmarks for the David Fairchild Elementary.

Bermuda Chapter collected their UFO's and sold them at the February and March meetings, taking in \$300 which they donated to the Blind Society. The Blind Society responded with a gracious thank you and reported they are launching a program of vision rehabilitation therapy so that the donation was both timely and appreciated.

Neapolitan Chapter staged a very successful 3 day exhibit which had been 2 years in the planning with an attendance beyond expected. More programs had to be printed after the first day.

Habitat for Humanity samplers are being stitching by several chapters. Biscayne has so far stitched and personalized 25 samplers this year. Chain Stitchers has been working with Habitat for Humanity for over a decade and stitched more than 200 samplers during that time. So far this year, at least 5 families are awaiting dedication of their new homes and Chain Stitchers look forward to many more in June. Neapolitan also provides a large number of samplers for their local Habitat for Humanity.

Several chapters collect and distribute items such as small toiletries and pop-tops.

Thank you to those chapters that sent reports.

Last month we had a stitch-a-thon and collected over \$2,000.00 for the church's soup kitchen. This month is the end of our year with presentation of all works of stitches and a pot lunch which is always delicious.

During the summer we get together to stitch but there is no set meeting since so many go off island.



BISCAYNE

I am still recovering from all the fun I had at Crystal River Stitching. Our guild was represented by Adrienne Meyer, Anna Roman, Schelley Iman-Loch and myself. Three of us were definitely dedicated Manatee Derby Racers, but alas only Adrienne came out a winner both at the races and with winning several Opportunity Baskets.



Our May meeting stitching program featured an Ort Keep using small 8 ounce tomato cans. This design was shared from the designer, Evelyn Riggins, a member of my plural chapter, The Stitch'n Belle's of Aiken, South Carolina, with permission for use by any EGA Chapter when accompanied by newsletter acknowledgement. Members stitched on 10 or 14 mesh plastic canvas with their color choices of yarn and their choices from variations of the Smyrna and Waffle /Norwich stitches. Once stitching was completed, the plastic canvas was wrapped around the can. Then, using the braided joining stitch it was snuggly secured to the can. The over wrapping of the edges covered all exposed metal therefore the top and bottom were nice and smooth. Knowing that we all stitch in various places throughout our homes and when we are visiting, members can now color co-ordinate the Ort Keep to the specific room and make a crazy one to have in that travel stitching bag we all have.

Our upcoming June Meeting is our last for the summer. We have requested members to bring in completed Ort Keeps, finished Mary Hickmott's Florentine Samplers (which have been worked on since January) and the GCC Bargello Challenge pieces which are due to be sent for critiques. Several of our members also participated in the GCC Needlework Tool Case being done along with another Sun Region Chapter and we hope to get photos of those in the future.

Our Outreach program continues to be very active with four partner families to receive their personal Habitat for Humanity Sampler on June 14th. To date, we have stitched 60 military Kissing Pillows, 40 cozy caps for Jackson Memorial Hospital Pediatric Unit and 18 for Baptist Pediatric Oncology Clinic. We have delivered over 15 pounds of pop-tops to Ronald McDonald House and 20 pounds of toiletries for families who stay at "The House" while their children are being treated at Jackson Memorial Hospital Medical Center. The David Fairchild Elementary School received 50 stitched bookmarks through the combined efforts of Biscayne and the Royal Palm Chapter of ANG, which brings our total to 200 distributed to this and four other local elementary schools for reading accomplishments.

As we are still in the process of collecting dues, our membership may be affected once new data is received. However, current membership numbers are 50 composed of (1) our sister Auckland NZ Chapter, (49) Primary members, (4) Plural members and two known non-renewals due to relocation and the passing of one member.

Over the summer, Biscayne plans on doing the Colonial Band Sampler which was first featured in the March edition of NeedleArts. The Stitch-In's will be lead by Martha Milnes, one of our two resident Master Craftman members.....our needles are never idle even during the summer!!

Biscayne Chapter wishes all Sun Region members a safe and happy sitiching summer!!
