Sawgrass Marriott Golf Resort & Spa is located just south of Jacksonville and north of St. Augustine off Highway A1A. Address is 1000 PGA TOUR Blvd., Ponte Vedra Beach, Fl 32082.

Date to be there is September 13 - 14.

Directions found on Google, AAA and locals use this for those coming from the south. I have used this route.

I-95N take exit 329 for St. John's 210 toward Ponte Vedra/ Green Cove Springs. Turn right onto County Road 210E (3.3 mi). Turn left onto US1N (1.4 mi.). Take the Nocatee Parkway exit (4.3 mi). Continue onto Palm Valley Rd. At the traffic circle take the 2nd exit onto Mickler Rd. Left onto A1A. Left onto PGA tour Blvd.

Directions from the north. I-295 exit at Butler going East. South onto A1A. Right onto PGA tour Blvd.

There have been some changes with recent remodeling. If you

were there before you will notice the lobby and a few of the restaurants have changed. You will have access to the Health Club and Spa. Complimentary self-parking. Cabana Club Beach Access located along the Atlantic Ocean. There is hotel transportation to the Cabana Club, golf and the Sawgrass Shopping Village. There are four outdoor pools and three whirl-pools, so pack that bathing suit.

The second motion appears complex at first but is basically an attempt to clarify the procedure for presenting and voting on a between sessions motion. It was taken directly from the national procedure on BSM and will surely be abbreviated and amended at this meeting. Secretary Lynn Abbey had difficulty even getting a quorum for our two between session votes earlier this summer since our current policy is not clear.

Please read through to understand so you can participate in paring this motion down to the essentials, yet make it clear to all those who read it.

How wonderful that so many of you are going to be participating in our International Touring Teacher opportunity! In November Alison Cole will be traveling to St. Petersburg where she will be teaching "Rambling Clematis", a stumpwork and goldwork feast for the eyes (and fingers). Sun Region funds are being used to offset the cost of this class, and the lucky participants get to take a two day class for the cost of their kit!

Don't forget about Sun Region's 2014 Education Grant! This is a great opportunity for your chapter. Each chapter is authorized \$200 toward a group correspondence course or workshop, and that money can be used to offset any of your costs. There are minimum numbers for participation and advertising requirements if your chapter can't make the minimums, so this is also an opportunity for members of your chapter to join up with another chapter and join in on the fun. 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HISTORIAN - Karan Quíntero, chaír

The Sun Region 1986 Seminar, "Back to College", was accurately named because it was held at Rolllins College located in Winter Park, Florida. Sun Region members received a black and white brochure enticing them with a fee of only \$125 for the June 29, 30 and July 1st event. This fee included the class tuition, double rooms on a first come, first served basis in an air conditioned building with elevators, five full cafeteria style meals, Monday breakfast through Tuesday lunch with four coffee/tea breaks. However, members were advised that few area restaurants were open on Sunday and the college could provide supper for an additional \$5.

McKean Hall would have four rooms which would be using a multiple-convenience bathroom and a building phone for emergencies. The pool would be open Sun/Mon from 4-6pm so members could relax before and after all the fun started. Large poorly lit lounges would house the classes and attendee's were encouraged to bring their personal floor stands and lighting. Parking was below McKean Hall so attendees were advised to drop off luggage/supplies so walking uphill would not be unduly laborious. (*We NEVER bring more than we need too...LOL...maybe not then.*)

Class proficiency levels were "Beginner's to Intermediate" with wonderful teachers and varied techniques: 1. "Butterflies with Jewel" (\$17/Silk & Metal on Mono Canvas) by Le E. Brady; 2. "Japanese Leaf Design" (\$6/ Intermediate Crewel with Appleton Yarn on Moire Fabric) by Ellen Carlson; 3. "Italian Shaded Flower" (\$15/Silk & Metal) by Rena Gordan; 4. "You'-nique Samplings (\$12/Reversible Blackwork, Drawn Thread, Holbein & Needlelace) by Joanne Gutwein; 5. "Cambria" (\$25/Canvas, Beading, Silk & Metal) by Dorothy Markley; 6. "Triangularity's" (\$10.00 Quilting) by Deanna Powell; 7. "Sampler" (\$50/Pulled Thread with White China Silk on Congress Cloth by Eileen Sullivan; 8. "Blackwork Embroidery Handbag" (\$10/Pulled Thread, Hemstitch Edgings, Gold & student Color choice thread on Lugana by Barbara Thomas; 9. "Angel with Trumpet" (\$22.50/Silk & Metal, Couching, Blackwork, Pattern Darning, Herringbone, Coral Knots, Whipped Outline & False Chain on Linen by Martha Pearle Vogt and the final 10, "Italian Cutwork' (\$15/Drawn Work, Ajoure/Pulled Work, Bullion Work, Square Reticella on Linen. *You think those girls were working hard.....YOU KNOW IT!!*

Sunday from 12-6pm and 7-9pm the Bookstore was open to everyone's delight. A "Meet The Teachers" session allowed Sun Region members to view the upcoming seminar class projects. The Hospitality Room on the first floor allowed members to meet with old friends, chat and chill before the two intense days of learning began.

Monday the Central Florida Chapter provided afternoon snack's. The evening supper special treat was Audrey Francini as the guest speaker. Members could indulge with wine that evening and the optional guest could attend for an additional \$10.

Tuesday finished up the classes and luggage was packed requiring the room key be returned to the Registration Chair at the end of Seminar located in McKean Hall or a \$20 fee would be charged to the registered name. Everyone had to be, OUT, OUT, OUT, by 5pm Tuesday.

An exhibit was open but location and hours were not provided in the seminar booklet. However, there were schematic diagrams of all four floors of McKean Hall, a name roster of all seminar attendees (On Campus 119 and three Off Campus = 121= WOW!! WOW!!) and a full page of Special Attractions and Items of Interest provided by the Winter Park Chamber of Commerce in the Seminar Booklet.

The Seminar Committe was composed of two Co-Chairs, Florence Flum (Biscayne) and Nancy Paul (Coral Springs); Secretary, Margaret Baretleman (Sarasota); Treasurer, Anita Walker (Sand Dunes); Faculty, Ruth Cook (duClay & Okeefenokee); Facilities/Equipment/Classroom Assignments, Kay Smith (Central Florida); Hospitality, (Gulfview & Treasure Chest); Brochure, Dorothy Walker (Suncoast); Registration, Joanne Gutwein (Indian River); Monday Evening Dinner Program, (Biscayne); Bookstore, Betty Fogarty (Coral Springs), Exhibit, Janet Hill (Hibiscus) and Goody Bags, Clarke Harrison (SR Director, Sand Dunes). *Thirteen different Chapters, represented by some terrific women, contributed to the success of this seminar.....IS THAT NOT AWESOME!!*

<u>OUTREACH</u> - JoyceAnne Stevens, chair

Summer is a slow restful time for many Sun Region chapters. Some members leave the state for cooler places. Some chapters have stitch-ins during the summer months but no regular meetings until September. Several Sun Region chapters continue to work on year long projects and many members continue to stitch and/or plan for fall Outreach projects.

Bermuda Chapter is making plans for a sale and tea in the fall with proceeds going to a cancer organization called PAL's.

Biscayne Chapter completed 10 Habitat for Humanity samplers this summer for a total of 25 in 2014. They also stitched 15 Kissing Pillows bringing this year's total to 75. 24 "cozy caps" were given to Ronald McDonald House making a total of 63 caps so far this year. In addition, 38 pounds of toiletries and 20 pounds of pop tops were delivered to the Ronald McDonald House. Biscayne Chapter members collect pennies, stamps, toiletries, and Coupons for Education for various groups.

Central Florida Chapter is continuing work on stitching hearts to apply to a wall hanging for the new Ronald McDonald House. The project is called "Hearts A Fire".

duClay Chapter held a month long exhibit of Christmas related items during July, calling their display, "Christmas in July".

Gulfview Chapter continues to support the Linus blanket project.

Neapolitan Chapter in addition to the many Habitat for Humanity samplers stitched and presented was able to make a donation of \$400 to Habitat. The money came from the profit made at their biannual exhibit and sale.

Sand Dunes Chapter will be presenting 2 Habitat samplers later this month to new homeowners and continue to work on the Christmas stocking for the Children's Advocacy Center.

Sea Grape Chapter members are very busy stitching EGA bookmarks to be given out at their February 2015 needlework show. As of July over 500 bookmarks had been turned in. The knitters in the chapter have so far this year given 124 baby caps and 145 chemo caps to Lee Memorial Hospital.

There are a multitude of wonderful ideas for outreach being carried out by Sun Region Chapters. I would like to call to your attention to several National Outreach projects. The EGA store at the EGA web site has several really great stitching projects for sale with proceeds going to a couple of different medical research projects. These would make wonderful programs or SAL's for chapters. The designs are various techniques and have been donated by the designers to EGA. Please remember that if you use them for a program each participant must have their own copy.

Kathy Singleton, Region Director



Kathy began stitching at the age of 5. She would spend the weekends at her grandmother's house and she learned embroidery and crochet from her. Mind you, this was free hand embroidery, no counting, no hoops, etc. Her first real project was a chicken scratch apron – yellow – a color Kathy now doesn't really care for. Her grandmother embroidered quilt squares and Kathy would embroider the stamped pillowcases to match. Naturally, surface embroidery remains her favorite stitching.

She continued stitching through the 70's where she was in demand to embroider on jeans, jackets, etc etc. Remember all of that? In the

80s' she started bigger projects, including crewel, pulled thread, and bead embroidery. And that's when the Christmas stocking thing started. She has now stitched a stocking for everyone in her family – that includes her immediate family, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, etc. etc. Now when anyone gets married or has a baby, the question becomes what will the stocking look like. Her niece's fiancée bothered her for a year making sure that he was going to be presented one, thus leading Kathy to believe that is why he married her niece.

Kathy has held lots of positions in EGA having joined Windy Stitchers in Chicago when she discovered a flyer for EGA at a local shop. She's held every chapter position except for president. She is proud of her two terms as National Treasurer and the work that was accomplished there. That experience really broadened her knowledge of EGA's workings and the reasons why some things are done the way that they are. At the region level, she has chaired a region seminar and retreat and currently serves as the region treasurer.

Melody Bryan, Assistant Region Director



Melody's history with EGA goes back a long way. She joined EGA when she was still in high school. She was a charter member of the now defunct LeMoyne Chapter in Jacksonville. She found out about a guild forming from the LNS owner who became a lifelong friend and still is today. She remained active in LeMoyne for a few years but her developing passion was showing purebred dogs and that took over and dominated her life for the next 25 years.

Like many of you – Melody learned to embroider and crochet from her grandmother. She learned to do simple needlepoint at about age 8 or 10. Even though she was very involved in traveling and exhibiting Afghan Hounds, needlework was always a part of her life.

In the mid 2000's, Melody joined the Dixie Chapter in Columbus, GA in which she still retains a plural membership. She decided after moving to Orange Park in 2008 that she should visit the duClay Chapter. She originally joined as a plural member, but has been primary member for a few years now. She has held a couple of offices in duClay and is currently VP/Programs & Education.

These days Melody spends a lot of time doing traditional wool rug hooking. She's been a "hooker" for about 15+ years now. She is a member of the NF Rug Hooking Guild as well as their parent national guild. She is an avid knitter, has a deep love of samplers and the history that goes along with them, and still enjoys doing various types of canvaswork.

Cheri Hammer, Secretary



Cheri has been fascinated with stitching from a very young age. Completely self-taught and self-guided, she gobbled up all of those crafty kits you get as a child. Then she ventured into counted cross-stitch, spending years making little x's on fabric. But then one day she saw a poster for a needle art exhibit, and that totally changed her world! The Sand Dunes Chapter in Northwest Florida held a bi-annual show and that was Cheri's introduction into the wonderful world of EGA.

Cheri joined Sand Dunes in the early 90s, and quickly volunteered to be the night liaison for the chapter. Education is her passion, and she wanted the night meeting attendees to have the same opportunities as the day meeting attendees. Over the years, several times she has held the position of education chairman and/or vice president (in charge of programs).

Cheri has also been her chapter's region representative, and has been exposed to Sun Region operations. She was the Merchandise Night chairman for both the 2000 and 2011 national seminars. She is currently the education chairman for both her chapter and the region.
