<u>EDUCATION</u> - Cherí Hammer, chaír

Your education committee has been busy, busy, busy! As you know, last fall, Sun Region brought in Alison Cole as part of the International Touring Teacher (ITT) program and the class was a resounding success! In fact, it went so well that the region is once again applying for an international teacher in conjunction with the national seminar, so stand by for further information when it becomes available.

In addition to the ITT program, the region also provided a \$1000 scholarship opportunity for a lucky Sun Region member to attend the 2015 International Embroidery Conference (IEC), Threads through Time. We had very good participation, and the competition was very close. The scholarship winner was Donna McFarland from the Indian River Chapter! We look forward to her article on the conference in an upcoming edition of Sun News, and to her presentation at a Sun Region meeting.

Another activity since the last newsletter was submission of a proposal to national for the Gay Phillips Education Grant. We were successful with our proposal, so we will receive \$5000 to be used toward bringing touring teacher(s) into the region and offering classroom opportunities to all members within the region. The classes/lectures will be held in multiple geographic locations throughout the region to maximize availability to Sun Region members. This activity is still in the planning stages.

And don't forget there is still a \$200 education grant available to all chapters during this calendar year. The educational opportunity can be something other than a GCC or a workshop – just be sure to get it pre-approved. Details for grant application are available on the Sun Region website.

Finally, this will be my last newsletter article as Education Chair. Deby Talley is your new Education Chair, and she brings a wealth of knowledge and talent to this position. She will do a great job for you!

<u>HISTORIAN</u> - Karan Quíntero, chaír

The year of 1987 brought the seminar once again to, "Back to College II" held at Rollins College from June 23-25th. Everyone was welcomed by the Sun Region Director, Clarke Harrison, in the opening message enticing all to have a "FANTASTIC TIME". The atmosphere encouraged attendee's to relax, visit in the halls, stitch in their pajama's and enjoy the varied great food offered after a short walk to the dining room. The registration fee was \$135 which included a double room in a building with AC and elevators, six meals and four coffee/tea breaks (*doesn't sound bad to me*). All classes were held in the lounges of the McKean building and members were strongly encouraged to bring lighting and advised all meals would be cafeteria style. The rooms were on a first come/first serve basis with basic linens provided, therefore, members requiring extra towels had to bring them (*with all we pack, a few extra towels, not a problem*). The brochure also listed local museums and restaurants for those who chose to investigate the area.

Ten classes were offered: 1) Clancy by LeE Brady -canvas(\$19), 2) Seminole Bands-patchwork by Ellen Carlson (\$4), 3) Open Canvas Potpourri- linen by Regi Kaye (\$20), 4) Silk & Metal Ultrasuede Purse-transfer surface stitching by Rena Gordon (\$25), 5) Victorian Bag-salem cloth & tatting by Francye E. Farley (\$6.50), 6) Spring-congress cloth counted & pulled thread by Jonalene Gutwein (\$24), 7) Amelia Angel-canvas by Gelendore McLaughlin (\$15), 8) Angel with Harp-linen by Martha Pearle Vogt (\$22.50), 9) The Dirndl Marie-Dollmaking-hand sewing by Ulla, Baron Von Schoeler (\$40) and 10) Victorian Opulence-crazy quilting by Deanna Powell

(\$20). Lots of techniques and lots to learn.

The seminar was held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Activities included a Sun region meeting, Goody Bags filled with items from 41 sources, a Meet the Teachers session, a Banquet with door prizes from 27 sources were given to the best of Embellished Clothing worn by members present and when members were not attending classes, there was an exhibit of needle art and a Book Store where members could easily stock their personal libraries.

Every effort was given to secure the 105 registrants one of their three choices and 18 of 20 Sun Region Chapters were represented. How financially successful was this seminar? Who knows because our file lacks that information. What we do know is that this Seminar Committee was lead by Co-Chairs -Sara Fike & Louise Sundstrom (Indian River) and included Treasurer-Alethea Walker (Treasure Chest), Faculty-Ruth Cooke (duClay), Registrar-Peg Emerson & Louise McWilliams (Sea Grape), Facilities-Julia Thibodeau (Central Fla), Hospitality-Edna Sutch (Gulfview & Coral Springs), Brochure-Florence Flum (Biscayne), Participants' Notebook-Lois Ebert (Neapolitan), Book Store-Ruth Stuver (LeMoyne), Exhibit-Lois Coleman (Hibiscus) and Goody Bags-Mary Lou Stransky (Sand Dunes) who all worked hard and were very successful in organizing this memorable time for the attendee's!!

<u>OUTREACH</u> - JoyceAnne Stevens, chair

Several Sun Region chapters participated in Stitch in Public activities during February. Canopy Oaks stitched on Valentines Day. Eleven Central Florida members stitched at 5 local libraries in Orange and Seminole Counties. Chain Stitchers stitched at the Leesburg Market, Gulfview stitched at the Regency Park Library, Sand Dollar stitched at the Hobby Lobby in Daytona and Sand Dunes stitched at Books a Million. Response was varied and several chapters are rethinking their locations for next year.

The stitched samplers for Habitat for Humanity remain an important outreach project for Sun Region chapters. Biscayne contributed samplers to 10 new Habitat home owners in February. Chain Stitchers are busy stitching for upcoming dedications. Gulfview and Neapolitan continue to support Habitat with stitched samplers. Indian River contributed 14 samplers last year and so far this year 5 new homes are in progress.

Soldier Kissing pillows are another on-going project for Biscayne, Indian River, and Gulfview.

Gulfview in addition to their very successful exhibit back in November and December held a mini exhibit at the Regency Park Library and Indian River currently has an exhibit at the Melbourne Library. Indian River will have a beading exhibit at the Suntree/Viera Library in March, an exhibit at the Satellite Beach Library in June, and an exhibit in the Malabar Library in November. Sea Grape held a Needle Art Exhibit February 12 -14 in celebration of its 40th anniversary. About 100 pieces were on display. Also on display were a number of baby caps and chemo caps that Sea Grape members have made. All together Sea Grape members have donated 263 chemo caps and 243 baby caps for a total of 1895 hours in 2014.

Central Florida has begun stitching Breast Cancer Ribbon bookmarks for women receiving chemotherapy at local Orlando hospitals and cancer centers. Central Florida has started putting meeting notices in the newspaper and is also working Jo-anns Fabric stores to arrange needlework demonstration days.

Chain Stitchers has encountered an unusual situation with their local Habitat affiliate. Habitat is developing a "brownfield" site for returning military and veterans. Since the homes are temporary residences, Chain Stitchers is looking at a different type of dedication item.

Indian River collected and delivered 47 needlework kits and 27 hoops to the Viera Veterans Clinic.

Sand Dunes 2015 Outreach project will repeating last year's very successful project of Christmas stockings for the Children's Advocacy Center.

Sarasota has been doing free stitch-ins at the Jacaranda Library in Venice. So far they have done beading, needlepoint, cross stitch, and silk ribbon embroidery. Classes were limited to 10 people with several members volunteering to teach and help.

Several chapters collect items which are donated to various groups. Biscayne also knits or crochets caps for pediatric oncology patients, collects used stamps, coupons for education, pop-tops, pennies, and toiletries. Gulfview members knit, crochet, or quilt blankets for the Linus Project. Indian River collects toiletries for the Daily Bread initiative in Melbourne and has so far collected 44% of their goal. They are planning to increase their goal. At Christmas, Sarasota collects goodies such as soaps, cosmetics, razors for Bethesda House in Sarasota.

All in all, a tremendous amount of outreach by EGA members and chapters in Sun Region. Thank you to everyone for everything you do.
