## EDUCATION - Deby Talley, chair

The Phillips grant committee continues to work on how to implement the region plan for video and online education. We hope to have a mini video to showcase at the Sun Region Seminar in May, if not before. I would like to ask for someone to step up and chair this committee. We are continuing to do funding to the chapters for GCC'S and educational events. I am in the process of rewriting the instructions to make it easier for all of us to handle, and to have consistent paperwork for tracking purposes. I will have this for all chapter reps at the Region meeting in April.

Speaking of GCC's, we now have the new Sunshine GCC that is region run. All of the details were in the last newsletter. I am going to announce that the first one will be Keeping In Shape, a beading GCC. I am hoping that someone will offer to be the coordinator for this project.

The committee has also been working on what to do with profits from Stitchers' Garden, the 2015 Seminar. We have been looking into scholarships for future region educational events and plan to have some announcements at the Spring Region meeting.

Finally, since the stash sale has generated so much money, the Executive committee had me apply for an International Touring Teacher. We should know if we are selected by the Region meeting.

## HISTORIAN - Karan Quíntero

Our big event for 1990, "Stitcher's Round Up!" had the Sun Region members come up to the Holiday Inn Hotel & Convention Center in Jacksonville, Florida, May 4th -6th, 1990. Attendees received a warm welcome from the Sun Region Director, Janet Hill and the Seminar Chairman, Alice Mae Johnson. There was even a Sheriff, Hetty Ricker (Suncoast) in case the ladies got rowdy! The committee was composed of three Suncoast members, one member from Indian River, Hibiscus, Coral Springs, Gulfview, Biscayne, Sarasota, Sea Grape and two from Du-Clay, and LeMoyne Chapters.

Registration was open to all members of EGA with Sun Region members given preference in class selection. Pre-registration was not accepted before January 4th and was closed one month later, February 4th. The \$125 registration fee was accepted by check only and included tuition, the Saturday night barbecue wearing your best country western duds, two lunches and four coffee breaks. Kit fees were due upon confirmation of class. Applicants had to list three different classes, if they did not their registration was moved to the bottom of the selection list (these ladies meant business!!).

As tightly as this seminar was run, there was plenty more to do and see. The bookstore, the boutique, the region meeting to attend, the teacher showcase, and the exhibit, but it didn't finish there. The LeMoyne Chapter was given a Wine & Cheese Party at the Jacksonville Museum of Science & History as thanks for their volunteer work. There were 200 antique dolls dressed by LeMoyne members on display as well as other additional tex-tiles.

Ten classes were presented to our region, all from local region teachers. Now the difficult decisions as to which class to take fell to the individual members. The classes were "Spring Bunny" (Ellen Carlson-Crewel \$10), "The Kokeshi Dolls" (LeE Brady-Canvas & Applique \$30), "Papillon, An Introduction to Needlelace" (Ritva Bowman-Needlelace \$12.50), "Ultrasuede Evening Bag with Blackwork (Bette Elovitz-Canvas \$38), "M'Lady's Fantasy Flowers" (Francye Farley-Needlelace, Pulled Thread, Couching \$35), "Detached Silk & Metal Butterfly" (Rena Gordon-Canvas, Silk & Metal \$23), "Hardanger Design Notebook Class" (Jonalene Gutwein-Hardanger \$14), "A Jamestown Spring Bouquet" (Lydia Hoopes-Shadowork & Crewel \$30), "Sara" (Glendore McLaughlin-Canvas, Pulled Thread, Pattern Darning, Embroidery \$20) and "The Bird Feeder" (Elsa Parrish-Canvas, Detached Applique, Needleweaving \$30).

These ladies did a wonderful job of providing a great experience for all those Sun Region members who attended!

We also made beaded scissor fobs to sell at our boutique at the upcoming quilt show.

In January, Canby Robertson taught a "methods" class on "Lettering for Surface Embroidery" to share the skill of professional lettering for non-counted embroidery. In February, Canby taught a class on "Jacobean Constellation . . . and exploration of Crewel Embroidery". Students stitched a crewel design that was created in 2003 to honor the 30th anniversary of the EGA Constellation Chapter, Baltimore. Both classes were well attended and helped raise money for the Suwannee Stitchers' treasury.

At our March meeting, we will be finalizing our plans for the quilt show. The Trenton Suwannee Valley Quilt Festival will be held on Saturday, March 19th from 9:00 to 4:00 and the Suwannee Stitchers will have a boutique booth. We will be selling stitching-related items, stash materials, and other donated items. We are hoping this will be a successful fund-raiser for us. There will also be hundreds of quilts, dozens of vendors, antique dealers, food, quilt turning, vintage quilts at the Museum and much more. Save this date because you don't want to miss this event.

The Suwannee Stitchers will sponsor a Vintage Lace and Button Lecture on Saturday, April 9th from 10:00 to 1:00 at the Suwannee Valley Quilt Museum. This will include a slide show, a Bobbin Lace Demonstration, a display of hundreds of vintage buttons, and laces teaturing "Black Lace". Jo Ann Eurell, Marion Jones, and Sally Criswell, who are all experts in this field, will host this event. I have attended these lectures before and I can assure you they are informative and entertaining with breath-taking samples to view. The cost of this lecture is \$50.
