Many wonderful techniques were taught, someone did win the nametag contest (no documentation as to who) and there was a winner for a Special Drawing (drawing purpose nor winner was documented). CANOPY OAKS

Spring has been extremely busy for everyone in the Canopy Oaks Chapter. The end of April found our members and the staff of the LeMoyne Center for the Visual Arts accepting the selected entries for our exhibition, "What's the Point? Embroidery as Art", and delivering pieces for sale in the Boutique.

May 1 through 5 was our time to set up and prepare for exhibition. Twenty-two selected pieces from the EGA National Collection and 23 from Fiber Forum were unpacked. To complement the items shared by members of the North Florida Nature Coast Chapter of the Pomegranate Guild for Judaic Embroidery, a Torah cover and a Bema chair were borrowed from Temple Israel. Ann Kozeliski, Executive Director of LeMoyne and members of the exhibit committee did preliminary placement of the 124 pieces demonstrating various embroidery techniques. Kozeliski and Carole Fiore completed hanging the two dimension and displaying the three dimensional objects on Thursday. A volunteer who retired from the Museum of Florida History designed the lighting that enhanced the display of works of art in the exhibition.

An article promoting the exhibition was published in the community section of the Tallahassee Democrat. For those of you who know how important placement in the paper is, here are the facts: the article appeared on the back page, above the fold, full width of the paper, with 2 full color photos. This appeared one week before our opening. In addition, the exhibition was listed in the online tallahasseearts.org listing, and other online communi-ty listings.

The Canopy Oaks Chapter of EGA hosted a celebratory opening reception that was attended by 94 people. In addition to the opening reception, the following activities were held during the first 3 weeks of the exhibition:

- A workshop on basic needlepoint was led by Carole Fiore. Rather than holding the workshop in the education building, the workshop was held on the front porch of the LeMoyne, becoming a Stitch-in-Public event in addition to a class.
- A workshop on basic embroidery was led by Pam Doffek and held in the education building.
- Three gallery talks were given. The topics were: The Places You Can Go with EGA (Pam Doffek); 17th Century Crewel Embroidery (Linda Dean); Judaic Embroidery (Rebecca Lockenbach). One additional gallery talk will be given by Jennifer Bailey on creativity in embroidery before the exhibition closes on May 28.

Members of Canopy Oaks Chapter volunteered as docents to help visitors understand the embroideries that are displayed. Several docents were on duty each Saturday. Another individual provided docent and interpretative services several times on weekdays during the first 3 weeks and will again do so during the final gallery talk with will be held on a weekday. Visitors noted that the provision of the docents was most useful. Most people wanted to know about the techniques, the size of the ground fabrics, types of threads and fibers used, and the most frequent question was how long it took to stitch the piece. Placards talking about the various techniques were placed throughout the 3 galleries that helped answer some of the questions visitors might have when no docents were available.

During the first three weeks of the four week exhibition, 334 people have visited the exhibition. Comments from the attendees range include "absolutely beautiful," "I never imagined that there could be so many types of embroidery," "mind blowing," "one of the most unusual and striking exhibits I have been too, here in Tallahassee and elsewhere." Several people asked if the exhibition could remain up for more time so they could come back and bring summer visitors to this unique, surprising, and exceptional exhibition.

One of the outcomes for Canopy Oaks Chapter taking on the challenge of mounting this exhibition was to develop a greater understanding and appreciation of embroidery by the public. We definitely feel that this has been accomplished. One other expected outcome is a boost membership in the chapter. While many people voiced interest, time will only tell how many new members we garner as a result of the greater community awareness we have created through all these efforts.

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Putting on an Exhibit - Part 1

Rebecca Lockenbach, Canopy Oaks Chapter

Greetings from Canopy Oaks in Tallahassee. We have just finished our May exhibit at the LeMoyne Center for the Visual Arts. It was a resounding success. I will not go into describing the exhibit in this article, as Carole Fiore, our chapter's Outreach Chair did a marvelous job in her article. Instead, I want to share with you in this first installment, some of the preliminary planning that went into putting on an exhibit of this scale.

In thinking back over the more than 2 years that it took to bring this exhibit together, I would use the phrase "It takes a village to make a point in What's the Point? Embroidery as Art! It all started with an idea sparked by Pam Doffek and Carole Fiore as they viewed the Quilt Show at the LeMoyne in 2013. The first hurdle was to bring the idea to the membership for approval, and to get volunteers to serve on the exhibit planning committee. Pam Doffek worked with the LeMoyne executive director for a date selection with the knowledge that it would be a month long exhibit. After establishing both the chapter's approval and the May 2016 date, the planning committee began their work.

We used the who, what, when, where throughout the planning and implementation phases of the exhibit, even though we had the timeframe and location of the exhibit, there were several activities that needed to be performed. The Canopy Oaks Chapter members are a diverse group of stitchers, and though we have a common interest in embroidery, our backgrounds, including education, training and skills vary widely. As a result, we were able to pull the talents and expertise from the group. Our planning committee was composed of the following individuals: Pam Doffek, Education Chair; Carole Fiore, Outreach Chair; Anne Wright, President; and Rebecca Lockenbach, Region Representative. Pam and Carole served as the central point of contact and dissemination of information. In addition, Pam served as the liaison between our local group and EGA National Headquarters, in addition to being the liaison with LeMoyne. Carole took on the role of publicity as this was fitting for the Outreach Chair and one of the driving forces for the exhibit. Rebecca's work experience included project tracking and monitoring, and so she was tasked to develop a planning timeframe. Both a gantt chart to show the length of time and overlap of activities and a calendar to list the due dates, assignments, and responsible chapter member, with an associated volunteer list were designed for this purpose and were updated as needed throughout the process. (For interested parties, these can be provided).

The outline below is a list of the process used and items we had to consider:

Chapter Member approval (this may be an on-going process for both major and minor elements)

Assignment of Committee chair and members

Small committees/work groups for single tasks (e.g. review and selection of items for exhibit; docents; opening/closing reception; publicity). These assignments should be established early and included in the timeline action items.

Select Location

what are the requirements at the museum, exhibit hall,

are there costs to the chapter and what is included,

timeframe for the exhibit

what is the chapter responsible for during the exhibit

liability and insurance coverage and required forms

Date and length of time for the exhibit

Responsibilities and expectations during exhibit

Start Planning ahead:

Who to include – are there other embroidery/needlework, EGA groups or members in your area to include or invite. Will they be able to share in the costs and volunteers

Contact EGA Headquarters early if you want to request items from the National collection.

Communication is Vital

Recommendations made by planning committee, and presented to chapter executive board for approval and if necessary to chapter members for approval

Communicate via email, phone, chapter newsletters and chapter meetings to update members

Establish a timeline to complete action items/activities

Update timeline periodically

Communicate with members

Establish a point of contact for timeline updates

Publicity is the Key – newspapers – article on upcoming event, community calendar

Who is responsible and for what (chapter and/or museum/exhibit hall)

This represents the major tasks we had to consider. Stay tuned for the next installment to be included in the Fall 2016 Newsletter.
