<u>Outreach</u> - Karen Rockenbach, chair

Is summer flying by, or what?? School has started and fall will be coming! Several of our chapters have been and will be busy as ever!

Biscayne chapter's Outreach efforts in the next three months will be to knit healing hats for children and young adults who are undergoing treatment at the local hospitals. They are continuing to discuss what they can do to replace the Kissing Pillow program. They are also talking about what they can do for the church (Riviera Presbyterian) where they hold their meetings.

Canopy Oaks is planning a "stitch in public" for their August meeting in the main library in Tallahassee. Several members are participating in the VA clinic support group by holding classes to teach veterans to knit, sew, and do needlework. The first session is scheduled in September for an open house, then followed by 2 basic sewing skills sessions and 2 knitting sessions.

Chainstitchers is one of our smaller chapters. They have 18 members and average 6-9 members at each meeting. They participate in "Stitch in Public" days as well as any activity to drum up interest in their chapter.

duClay Chapter knitters and crocheters connected with a local craft shop and contributed 20 knitted or crocheted blue hats in support of "hat not hate" anti-bulling program sponsored by Lion Brand yarn. Students wear the blue hats during October and this is the second year Lion Brand has sponsored the program. They were pleased with the contributions as they were made aware of the program one month before and are considering this an out-reach program for the coming year. During the month of October, they will have their needlework display at the Orange Park library.

Indian River chapter is teaching needlework to 20 children for 3 days. The sessions are 2 hours at the Melbourne Fee Avenue library each day. The children are 6 – 12 years old. The library is excited about this program and has handled registration. They continue to stitch Habitat for Humanity samplers and just awarded their 311th one. Our St. Lucie member has stitched samplers for her area besides their Brevard County.

Neapolitan Chapter continues to stitch Habitat for Humanity samplers. They will receive the requested amount of framed samplers for the third quarter 0f 2019 in early October. They are on track to receive approximately 125 samplers this year.

Sandhill Crane chapter continues to work on samplers for Habitat for Humanity for Citrus and Hernando counties. Two dedications are scheduled for Hernando county in the next month or so and three dedications in Citrus county between September and October. In October they will be making a donation of juice boxes, snacks and related items to the Children's Advocacy Center of Hernando county.

Sand Dollar chapter continues several programs. They crochet and/or sew fleece baby blankets for the local pregnancy centers; baby booties and hats for the Halifax Hospital NIC unit; sew walker pockets for 4 nursing home and rehab facilities; cross stitch Habitat for Humanity samplers; make handmade Christmas tree ornaments for special needs students at a local elementary school and make dresses for "Dress a girl around the world".

Sand Dunes chapter continues to stitch Habitat for Humanity samplers.

Sea Grape chapter continues knitting and crocheting chemo caps and lap shawls for Gulf Coast Hospital. Also, members make hats for babies and children at Golisano Children's Hospital. Their member, Betty Kingsnorth, was featured in the Ft.Myers News Press for the baby gowns she creates for babies who die in the hospital. She creates them from materials taken from old wedding dresses. From that article, the community has donated 14 wedding dresses to date. The chapter will work this fall to deconstruct them so Betty can continue her wonderful work.

Canopy Oaks members will be getting back to basics with a year-long program based on Mary Corbet's Row Sampler

(https://www.needlenthread.com). At the September kick-off, we will explore threads, grounds, stitches and possible completion ideas. To make the project more accessible, several members will donate ground fabrics and a selection of threads. We will add a few stitches each month through May.

At the September meeting, one of our newest members will show us a selection of "Flowers for Dimensional Effect" from which the group will select 3 flowers for her to present in November. Again, members will offer materials to encourage everyone to participate.

September is the month for members to either add or exchange 1 piece on their "Challenge to Finish" list. The Challenge began with new lists in May and the reveal and drawing will be in May 2020.

October's program will be on Dorset buttons, a vintage technique for

In October, the opportunity to participate in the Canopy Oaks display at the Westminster Oaks' Dining Room Gallery, which will run April through June 2020, will be explained and submission forms distributed. The "Isabella" GCC group has been meeting throughout the summer, working toward a completion date in November.


